

This would make you want to dance!






One day Bapi had to go to the village on the other side of the hill.

To reach that village he had to cross a dense forest.







As he walked along, he ran into...

You would be scared too if you saw how big the elephants were.






He started beating his dhol loudly.


The elephants were delighted to hear the dhol!
